



## 2/28/21 Sermon Notes

### “Trust”

#### Psalm 13

**Psalm 13 (CSB)** - <sup>1</sup> How long, Lord? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? <sup>2</sup> How long will I store up anxious concerns within me, agony in my mind every day? How long will my enemy dominate me? <sup>3</sup> Consider me and answer, Lord my God. Restore brightness to my eyes; otherwise, I will sleep in death. <sup>4</sup> My enemy will say, “I have triumphed over him,” and my foes will rejoice because I am shaken. <sup>5</sup> But I have trusted in your faithful love; my heart will rejoice in your deliverance. <sup>6</sup> I will sing to the Lord because he has treated me generously.

Even if he causes suffering he will show compassion according to the abundance of his faithful love.

For he does not enjoy bringing affliction or suffering on Mankind. (Lamentations 3:32-33)

*“Suffering refines what we trust in and how we talk about it.”*

**Trust looks like talking to God, sharing our complaints, seeking God’s help, and then recommitting ourselves to believe in who God is and what He has done - even if the trial continues.**

### Psalm 13

**Verses 1-2** - David combines TURN and COMPLAINT

**Verses 3-4** - David boldly ASKS God for help

**Verses 5-6** - Three affirmations of trust:

1. I have trusted in Your faithful love  
*Being a follower of Jesus requires we walk with a continual trust in God.*
2. My heart will rejoice in Your deliverance
3. The LORD has treated me generously

***Keep trusting the One who keeps you trusting.***
